NOTE FROM THE PRESIDENT

We are proud to announce that FIJI was recently selected as the Most Improved Chapter of the Year at the annual Greek Alumni Council (GAC) Awards Ceremony. Numerous hours of hard work and dedication went into this award, and I would be remiss without giving due credit to the two people who made it possible: **Timothy Kilduff (Kent State 1968)** and **Dave Wilens (2009)**. They served as liaisons between the Chapter and the school, and continuously met with the cabinet to ensure we were on track. In addition to this award, FIJI was also selected for the “Best Alumni Programming” Award, given annually to the Chapter who maintains the most involved network of graduate brothers. This is undoubtedly a sign of the exceptional involvement we frequently receive from you all. Thank You!

At the outset of this academic year, the Chapter selected two key areas of improvement where we devoted most of our time: improving our relations with the school, and developing our own brothers through additional programming and workshops. The Chapter is now proud to say we have brothers involved in a variety of extracurricular activities associated with the school. Our brothers include the president of the Rugby team, **Jack Viens (2017)**, the president of the golf team, **Jamie Wang (2018)**, Battalion Commander in Army ROTC, **John Rheaume (2017)**, research assistants, as well as members of professional associations such as AIChE, ACM, and ASCE. Our biggest improvement in involvement this year has come from the Interfraternity Council.

FIJI currently occupies three of the six executive positions on the council, as well as two chairman positions. One of these executives, **Hunter Peterson (2019)**, began a Global Diversification

and Inclusion Committee (GDIC) designed to make Greek Life at WPI more accessible to international students. He has already gained a lot of traction – just recently organizing a diversity speaker event, which over 500 members of the fraternity and sorority community attended. This campus involvement has put our brothers into contact with some of the most talented leaders in our community outside of FIJI, where they have been exposed to many new ideas which the Chapter has then been able to learn from.

This year, our events and workshops span an equally diverse landscape. We’ve been lucky enough to have graduate brothers **Michael Neece (1978)**, **Misael Diaz (2009)**, and **Brett Peroni (1993)** all come back to WPI at different times to teach us a little bit about what they’ve learned in the real world. Brother Neece educated our Chapter as well as the WPI community on the art of interviewing, Brother Diaz taught us about personal leadership style and how to succeed after college, and Brother Peroni taught us some of the foundational ins and outs surrounding intelligent investing and wealth management.

Moving forward, the Chapter hopes to continue to improve both academically and through extracurricular leadership development. We hope to invite many of the speakers we had this past year to conduct their workshops not only with our fraternity, but with the entire Greek community.

We had nearly 140 attendees, which included undergraduate brothers, graduate brothers, spouses and significant others! The new venue in the Rubin Campus, decorated in a formal setting with Fiji colors, provided a new tone to the event. Many brothers gathered at the chapter house before heading to the cocktail hour to socialize just outside the venue hall on campus. The night was completed with a Pi Iota ROTC Color Guard and a reciting of the Exile's Toast by **Dave Allen (2013)** all the way from Iraq. If you weren't able to make it this year be sure to mark your calendar for next year's Pig Dinner on April 21, 2018!

This past year has proven to be instrumental for new things to come. It has marked the beginning of resetting period in Pi Iota's Culture, which is making it possible to continue carrying on the legacy of this great chapter. I think it has been evident in the periodic update emails that you received over the last nine months, showing the Chapter's progress and leadership roles brothers have taken on - not only within the house, but in the community and up on the Hill. There has been a renewed sense of appreciation for the legacy the Chapter carries and for the Fraternity's values and what they stand for.

Here are several noteworthy accomplishments from this past year:

- They've kept the chapter house in order and made significant improvements to its interior, including new paint colors, re-purposing of spaces and making it a more welcoming place to be.
- They have been getting graduate brothers more involved at the Chapter level, but also at the school level by organizing leadership seminars for the campus to take advantage of.
- Lastly, from the fruits of all their hard work, they took home two prestigious awards at the 2017 Greek Awards Night in April:

 - * Chapter with the Best Graduate Programming

F.A. MORSE UPDATE

Brothers,

This year, the F.A. Morse Housing Corporation remains in good financial standing and we have settled our incorporation with proper tax filing status as a 501(c)7 entity.

Last summer, we were able to renovate the second floor bathroom, which consumed the majority of the funds available for capital expenditures. However, this past year alone, as “Ole 99” enters into its 118th year, the age of the house and its systems has become very apparent:

- We started the school year with an unexpected cast iron sewer line failure under 12 inches of concrete in the boiler room. A 12-foot long section of cast iron sewer line split open and began leaking into the lower portion of the basement.
- The main roof of the house is in need of replacement. It is a flat roof, and the rubber has receded, exposing large leak areas which has allowed water to seep down inside the walls to the dining room. We are trying to save capital to get that remedied as quickly as possible.
- Multiple copper pipes have sprung pinhole leaks or have simply cracked open, requiring emergency plumbing re-

pairs, and we have found that many of the main gate valves, which isolate portions of the plumbing system do not shutoff properly when closed. The boiler piping is corroded and the boiler exhaust system recently needed. The back slop sink has a serious leak into the basement.

- Part of the house has electric heat and the other part has forced hot water. Many of the individual room systems and thermostats do not work, meaning the heat is always on full or sometimes not at all.
- The kitchen is out of date, and the emergency fire pull cord system is currently being replaced.
- To keep the house up to code, the electrical system has required periodic costly work in the past few years.
- The window and exterior door frames need replacement around the house.
- The exterior siding needs repairs and replacement.
- The plaster in the rooms, the electrical facilities and internet access needs to be brought up to date.
- As we reviewed at this year’s Pig Dinner, Pi Iota needs to bring the talk of a much needed renovation of 99 Salisbury Street into reality. The last major renovations were done in the 1970’s and 1990’s. More details and discussion to follow as we enter into the new academic year.

THE IMMORTAL PHI GAM PROJECT FROM IHQ

There are more than 125,000 people waiting for an organ transplant in the United States and Canada. Sadly, approximately 22 people die every day because they did not receive an organ in time. The good news is that YOU can make a difference!

The need for Organ Donors is critical:

- Approximately 79 organ transplants take place every day in the United States.
- Just over 10 percent of all organ recipients were between the ages of 18-34 years.
- On average, 150 people are added to the nations organ transplant waiting list every day – one every 10 minutes.
- More than 1,000 of them are 10 years old or younger.
- About 11,000 are between the ages of 18-34.

One organ donor can save or improve the lives of up to 50 other people. In 2015 Phi Gamma Delta partnered with Donate Life for the Immortal Phi Gam project to increase the number of donors across North America. Since the partnership started, over 500 brothers have registered as Immortal Phi Gams and undergraduate brothers. Just last academic year Connor Henderson from Vanderbilt and Stephen Corbitt from the University of South Carolina have donated stem cells and bone

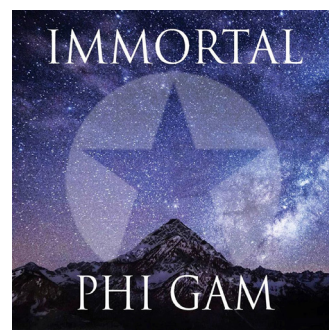
marrow respectively through this initiative.

Making yourself immortal is a simple 2 step process.

1. [Go to www.phigam.org/immortalphigam](http://www.phigam.org/immortalphigam) and register at the bottom of the web page.
2. Click on the link on the same web page that will take you to Donate Life's map page.

Click on the state or province where you are licensed to drive or live and register to become an organ donor.

If your license already has you registered as an organ donor we ask that you register with the Fraternity as an Immortal Phi Gam. Everyone that registers as Immortal Phi Gam will be recognized on the website and receive a membership card in the mail.
