The Brother's of the Pi Iota Chapter of Phi Gamma Delta are making an immense statement at Worcester Polytechnic Institute. Seen to the right is Brother Steven Rubin receiving an Honorary Doctorate Degree during WPI's 146th commencement ceremony. Last Fall, the Campus Center was named after Brother Steve Rubin who served on the Board of Trustees from 1996-2013 and was chairman from 2010 -2013; leading WPI through a period of expansion and recognition.

In addition, at the WPI 146th commencement ceremony, Brother Robert Foisie received an Honorary Doctorate after donating \$40 million to WPI, the highest single donation in WPI's history. The largest donation before was also by Brother Foisie for a sum of \$23 million. The WPI School of Business and new Innovation Center at Alumni Gym will be named in his recognition.

House Renovations Update



In response to a Brother's travels to Hong Kong...


I recently semi-retired here on the Cape after a 40 year career in the chemical industry. I spend over 20 years in Asia living in various countries with my family and we found it to be a wonderful experience.

Brother Hartzell Travels to South Korea for CTLT

This summer I had the opportunity to go to South Korea with Army ROTC. I spent four weeks with a Mechanized Infantry Company in Camp Casey, South Korea. This trip was part of Cadet Commands CTLT program. Baker Company constantly trains to improve its ability to fight with M2A3 Bradley Fighting Vehicles.

Preparing for live-fire exercises as well as fighting in a Bradley involves simulator qualification. It is an electronic "pop-up" range that has the proper controls of the turret for the actual Bradley. I was able to participate in this training environment multiple times, actually making significant progress with my gunner

while I was there. We also were able to execute a Platoon size simulation. For this training I



served as a Vehicle Commander, directing a driver and gunner, as well as reporting up the chain of command targets my vehicle identified and destroyed.

On top of this valuable simulator time, I spent many days working with the platoon during inventories, training classes, and weapons qualification.

I was able to travel off post and visit the DMZ (Demilitarized zone at the North Korean Border) and walk around the building where the Armistice was signed 60 years ago. We wanted to experience the cuisine and try a local delicacy of dog meat. My commander took control and insisted that we experience the food. Except for the moral conflict of eating man's best friend, it was a great experience.


Brother Foley at CULP in Burkina Faso, Africa

This summer I spent a month teaching English at a Military Academy in Burkina Faso, which is a small country in Western Africa. This was my first time every leaving the US and I was given this incredible opportunity through my involvement in the Army ROTC program. I was part of a summer program called CULP (Cultural Understanding and Learning Proficiency), which was put in place to ensure that young officers gain experience with other cultures to avoid the culture shock of going abroad for the first time when being deployed.

This was an eye opening experience that I will remember for the rest of my life, I got the chance to sit down with foreign Cadets

and get a snapshot of how they live. I was amazed at how humble the people I met were. They were all very proud of what little they had rather than concerned with what they didn't have like we do too often here in the US. Everyone was polite and enthused to meet you. They would always run out to the road jumping up and down waving as we would

ride by in the backs of pickup trucks. One thing I will always remember is when I was preparing to leave I presented one of the friends I had made at the Academy with a New England Patriots key chain I brought along. When I gave him this he started to cry and tell me about how much the short time we had spent together meant to him. I was surprised because to me it was just a key chain I bought for \$4 at the airport, but to



him it symbolized America. It really showed me how much of a positive influence we have on a good portion of the rest of the world. Looking back this was an incredible experience where I learned so much and made great relationships.


2014 FIJI Philanthropy Road Trip
